DISTRICTS 6 & 12 WORKSHOP AND POTLUCK

I have been given the privilege- and the responsibility- of trying to tell the story of our Districts 6 and 12 Workshop and Potluck. I think I have been able to keep in step with "I am responsible"- as long as "I am punctual" doesn't go with it. As it has evolved, our Workshop is a monthly meeting held in some member's home, starting with a potluck dinner and ending with a two hour meeting. The secretaries, Intergroup representatives and General Service representatives of all groups in our districts are specifically invited, with their spouses and guests, as well as all personnel of our Intergroup, Central Service Office and General Service Area; and we open our doors to anyone else who is interested. Possibly you may wonder how, with some 25 groups in our two districts, any home could hold all these people, but knowing people in general and AAs in particular, you probably understand

and that this has not been a problem. We have worries about it from time to time, but the worries have proved groundless so far. We have had from 9 to 40 people present in the last 2 1/2 years, and the time we had 9 and the time we had 40 we were only 4 months or so apart- both many months ago. You might say the Workshop originated because of an AA ego, although that wouldn't be fair. Some three years ago, Warren S. came across a notice that an

TWO THEMES GUIDE 16TH CONFERENCE ACTIONS
'PRINCIPLES AND 'RESPONSIBILITY' REFLECTED

"The voice of the Fellowship"- the 16th annual meeting of the General Service Conference of Alcoholics Anonymous at the Hotel Roosevelt, New York City, April 18- 23, 1966- expressed over and over again two A.A. sayings.

The twin ideas of "principles before personalities" (the official Conference theme, from Tradition Twelve) and "I am responsible" (from the 30th Anniversary Declaration) seemed to guide Conference members in all their sessions in behalf of the 31-year-old Fellowship.

Eighteen members of the General Service Board, G.S.O. Staff, Grapevine and A.A. World Service directors, and 88 elected Delegates (including 3 alternates 7 women, 42 Panel 15 members and 46 Panel 16) from Groups in the U.S. and Canada deliberated, listened, talked, and meditated all most around the clock to take "Advisory Actions," reach decisions, or voice the consensus of the Fellowship on---

G.S. BOARD--- Structure changes proposed by the trustees in 1965 were accepted with modification.

PREAMBLE---Wording was left unchanged.

1970 CONVENTION--- Miami, Chicago, and Seattle, in that order, were favored for a 35th anniversary international convention.

CLUBS, REHABS---Reaffirmed A.A.'s policy of "cooperation but not affiliation" with such facilities, as spelled out in Tradition Six.

INSTITUTIONS---Recommended establishment of a Conference Institutions Committee to encourage more feeling that "we are responsible for alcoholics behind walls.

AA IN SMALL COMMUNITIES--- More visits among groups, public meetings, contacts with clergy, police and physicians were suggested to help Loners become Groups.

CENTRAL OFFICES---Efforts should be increased to bring local intergroups into the Third Legacy communications network.

FINANCING---Value of the Regular Contribution Plan for Group support of world service was reaffirmed.

ATTRACTION---Growth of Public Information Committee activities within our Traditions was hailed as good Twelfth Step work.

ANONYMITY IN A.A.---Regard for others' anonymity is essential; within A.A. anonymity (but not secrecy) permits life-saving personal relationships and places principles before personalities.

GRAPEVINE---Continuing improvements in contents, appearance, and circulation were commended.

DIRECTORY--- Reaffirmed it is not for commercial use.

LITERATURE---Publication of a reader of excerpts from Bill's writings was approved.

GENERAL SERVICE CONFERENCE
ACCEPTS BOARD CHAIN.

Wed. Apr. 20- The General Service Board of A.A. will be changed into a body of 14 A.A. (Class B) and 7 non-alcoholic (Class A) trustees, members of the 16th General Service Conference decided today by accepting a Board re-structure plan.

Putting AA's for the first time in the majority on the Board is historic, because ever since the Board (then called the Foundation) was first formed in 1938 with five members, non-alcoholics have always been in the majority by one.

The change-over from the present Board alignment (10 nonalcoholics, 9 A.A.'s) to the new one probably will not take full effect for some years, according to Dr. John L. Norris, Rochester, N.Y., non-alcoholic Chairman of the G.S. Board who presented the new plan at the 1965 meeting.
