NEW YORK REPORT

DELEGATE'S MESSAGE.....
The Conference Plan defined in our Service Manual (Page 19) reads: It is a method by which A.A.'s collective group conscience can speak forcefully and put its desires for world wide service into effect. It is the structure that takes the place of government in A.A. It insures that the full voice of A.A. will be heard whether it represents the great majority or a minority. The Conference Plan was established as a guarantee that our movement-wide services would continue to function under all conditions. The Plan provides a practical successor to the founders of A.A."

Bill describes the final session of the 1st Conference in 1951. "We knew that the impossible had happened, that A.A. could never break down in the middle, that Alcoholics Anonymous was at last safe from any storm the future might bring. And, as Delegates returned home they carried the same conviction with them. Realizing our need for funds and better literature circulation, some did place a little too much emphasis on this necessity; others were a little discouraged, wondering why fellow members in their areas did not take fire as they had. They forgot that they themselves had been eye-witnesses to the Conference and that their brother alcoholics had not. But both here and at home, they made an impression much greater than they knew." Bill went on to say: "As I watched all this grow I became entirely sure Alcoholics Anonymous was at last safe---even from me."

The second and last Conference that I will ever attend is extremely difficult to describe. You're not as unsure of yourself,

you have gotten to know the Staff, Trustees, the Board and the other Delegates, many of them that you have grown close to. You shared the common bond of long days and nights of presentations, workshops, committee work, and share your area's progress and its lack of progress. You listen to ideas that have been successful in other areas, and bring them to your area.

The last day of the Conference, the outgoing Trustees make presentations, give farewells and express their deep gratitude for the privilege of being able to serve. It is an extremely emotional and moving experience. There was a feeling of sadness and then an overwhelming sense of gratitude of having participated in a General Service Conference.

Then as Bill described "wanting to somehow relate your experience to your fellow members everything you were witness to". To describe our tremendous growth and just how much G.S.O. contributes to all of us. 24,000 letters answered individually last year, 300 group changes everyday, and over 5,000,000 individual pieces of literature distributed--the activity of the General Service Office is mind boggling. Then to have someone tell me we don't need G.S.O... We're not going to contribute anything!!! I have a hard time understanding that. Then I remember what Bill said " they were not eye-witnesses to the Conference."

Now I understand why some of our past Delegates are still very active and willing to share in anyway they can. I hope I never lose the gratitude I feel right now for the privilege of serving as a Delegate from the Mid-Southern California Area.

MEDIA INTERESTED IN A.A.....

STAFF REPORT: In 1976 we answered 9,809 requests for information about AA from newspapers, magazines, radio, and TV, processed 5,484 press clippings, distributed 98 radio and 265 TV spots, sent 43 "AA- a Community Resource" displays to health fairs and county and state meetings, and learned of 96 anonymity breaks. We now list 232 P.I. Committees and 306 P.I. contacts. They receive the P.I.-C.P.C. Bulletin and much other material. When the "Brief Guide" pamphlet is re-run, it will be revised to avoid the exclusive use of masculin pronouns.

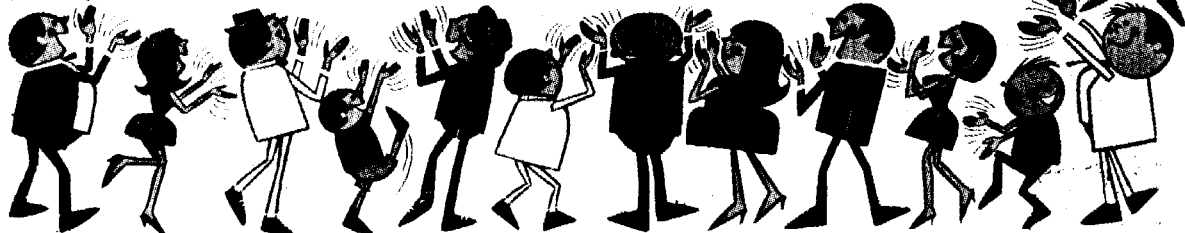

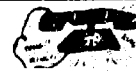

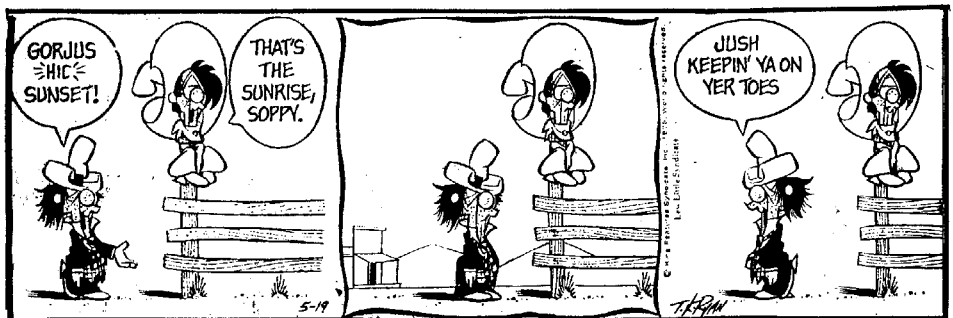

Highlights of the April 25th meeting. Frank A., Orange, led the meeting at which approximately 20 were in attendance. The subjects of discussion were as follows:

1. Is there a need for zoning the Orange County Intergroup Association?

The rapid growth of the fellowship in Orange County was discussed and compared to the rapid growth previously experienced by Los Angeles County and handled in a similar manner. Frank A. explained how, as a part of his Service Board function, he was assisting the formation of zones in Orange County. It is felt that a zoning structure would help bridge the gap between many groups and the central office.

Currently the county is divided into 14 zones with a chairman assigned to each zone. The largest group count per zone is 27, and the smallest group count per zone is 16. As the initial step in this restructuring, the zone chairmen are becoming acquainted with the groups in their zone. LETTERS OF GRATITUDE.....

As I near my one year birthday, my heart is not only filled with gratitude for Alcoholics Anonymous, but a very deep love for my mother, who, but for the grace of God, had ten years sobriety in the program. She wrote me probably the most beautiful letter a son could receive, not to mention a new member of AA. I would like very much to share with you and possibly the readers of Lifeline the letter that gave me the stepping stone of hope I needed so badly when I first came to AA.

Dear Mike, June 19, 1976

Received your letter- can't tell you how pleased I am the you are going to AA. It will open doors for you. In the Big Book read the promises-pages 83-84.

The most important thing is today. I caught a glimpse of your becoming honest for the first time-honest with Mike. I had to laugh about your saying Ray's boat and the Colorado property being yours! This built you up (you thought). If you will only stay with AA and learn to listen and then listen to learn. AA is a way of life- not just not drinking- that's only a small part of it. Also, be careful about the antibus and having just one drink; when they say it will make you sick, believe it - it will also make you dead.

You have been given an opportunity at a very early age to make some changes in your attitude that, if you are willing to go to any length, to achieve them, will give you PEACE, SERENITY, and HAPPINESS. Remember the "Man in the Glass"? If you are content within yourself that you are living a good, sober, honest life, then you won't have to put up a false front or facade.

Mike, you are a child of God. He loves you and forgives you daily for your mistakes. But in order for Him to help-- you have to ask Him. No fancy long prayers, just "God Show Me", and then be willing. If you don't believe that God can help you, fake it for the time being-

even that helps. Your new friends in AA will give you all the love from people that an alcoholic so desperately needs. Stick with the winners- pick out someone whose brand of AA you like or with whom you can identify, and ask him to be your sponsor. Then talk with him on a 1- to 1 basis about your living problems. Stay close to AA doors.

You know, when I was 16 and went to Austin to University of Texas, engraved in the side of the Administration building were the words, "ye shall know the truth- and the truth shall set you free". Beautiful words but I really didn't understand them until AA taught me to look at myself. When self-honesty came into my life, I found freedom- freedom from that need to please, freedom to just be me. Freedom from fear, that gnawing gut level hurt and fear of not measuring up. Dad doesn't understand all these things I am telling you about AA's way of life. He just knows I don't drink and I am easier to live with today. That used to bother me that I couldn't share my feelings with him. He and I have been married almost 20 years and yet my AA friends know more about me than he does. Wierd Huh?

Wherever you go in California, Texas or Timbuktu, Asia or Europe, you will find friends in AA. You can walk in anywhere and say Hi. My name is Mike and I'm a drunk-they love and understand you.

Tonight I am going to Winnie's 20th birthday meeting. She has asked me to speak for her. I am so grateful you wrote this week as I can share with that group your joining AA.

If you think later on you need to drink, or that you can't be alcoholic at 24, or that after such and such a period of dryness you can drink successfully- forget it! It gets nothing but worse.

You know me and making pickles? Think about this: I take a cucumber and turn it into a pickle-right? But, I can't take that same pickle and turn it back

into a cucumber! That's alcoholism. The funny thing is that today I don't want to drink. God, AA, and I got rid of the need to drink.

I could go on and on (and I have). I want your happiness and sobriety above all. I can't give it to you. This you have to do for yourself.

Your assignment for today: Read all of Chapter Five, Big Book.

Love, Mom

P.S. One thing you said alcohol was the cause for your attitudes? That's not entirely true. Because of our alcoholic personality- the loneliness, the fear, and the insecurity- we drank to make it easier to cope, and it (the booze) did work for awhile. But you see, I had this type of personality as a child, (and so did you) long before I ever saw or drank a drop. So it is our inner feelings that must change; and they will, a day at a time.

Thank you for the opportunity to share as this meant so much to me and still does. My birthday is June 2. My mother's is June 6. This year she will fly to California to take my cake with me as well as taking her own. I owe my life to God and AA. Funny thing I did not know when her birthday was. God did. Love, Mike M. (Costa Mesa)

Dear Fellow A.A.s: Orange, Ca.

This coming June 23rd I will have 7 years sobriety, which in no way could I have attained without your help, my friends. I wish to extend my deepest thanks to each and every one of you for your ehlp and love. And as my life passes one day at a time I shall never forget any of you fantastic people.

It seems at times in life we must make changes. And in our life now a change has come which is a change of great happiness and opportunity for us. But at the same time it entails sadness, as we must move away from Orange County and leave many wonderful friends behind. We are moving to Minden, Nevada which is just South of Carson City. We do hope if any of you get up our way, you'll look us up, and the welcome mat shall surely always be out for a bunch of wonderful drunks.

FOURTH STEP IN PRISON....

The Fourth Step is rough to take. It drags from your soul all of those built-in emotions, resentments and hate that has so carefully been guarded through the years. Sometimes, when the steam builds up in my boiler I creep into a liquor store and sneak a bottle out to try and suppress those emotions, but alcohol added to the flame does just what one would expect if he poured it on a REAL flame; it makes the problem even worse until perhaps, it gets the upper hand and boils out-most of the time AGAINST someone else. This has kept me in trouble more than I would ever admit, resulting in fights, beatings, arguments with my family, and brings out a surly character from my soul who even I didn't know.

Recently, the California Department of Corrections, through our Program Administrator, made it relatively easy for a convicted person to take the Fourth Step; not easy even outside, even rougher in prison. How many would-be tough guys want to admit that some of the buried 'treasure' is FEAR? Not many, for sure. I have to admit to myself that FEAR played a large role in my life. By that I don't mean COWARDICE--no, it was a different type of fear. Each day of my life, as a practicing alcoholic, I had to have that drink in the morning just so I could face another day of REALITY, and that's what the Fourth Step is doing for me----making me face reality.

I've discovered there are two shades of color in the mind, one is all pink and rosy, bringing into focus only those strokes that are nice to feel; no pain, no suffering. All of the things I WANTED in life were important to that alcoholic, and I wasn't satisfied with having all of my needs fulfilled---no, I had to have EVERYTHING I wanted, including a foggy mind with which to accept things like a denial of a WANT.

Today its really neat to know I can face reality sober. My resentments against a neighbor who had more than me aren't

important anymore; and when a crisis arises as to a conflict of personalities, it is pretty keen to be able to smile and say, "so be it", because the Serenity Prayer enters my life every day now, and I CAN accept the things I cannot change. Having taken the Fourth Step seriously, and having dug into my very soul for answers to questions I didn't even know existed, has changes my entire outlook on life, and I find that I no longer need to have a drink because someone said 'no', or because I don't like the looks of a neighbor. These elements of my own profile have gone, and today I feel a peace of mind I have never enjoyed before.

In summation, I think the State of California did me a favor in sending me to Chino where I could have the time to take an honest look at the interior of this vehicle I'm in control of, and I really needed a good 'overhauling', which time has given me. 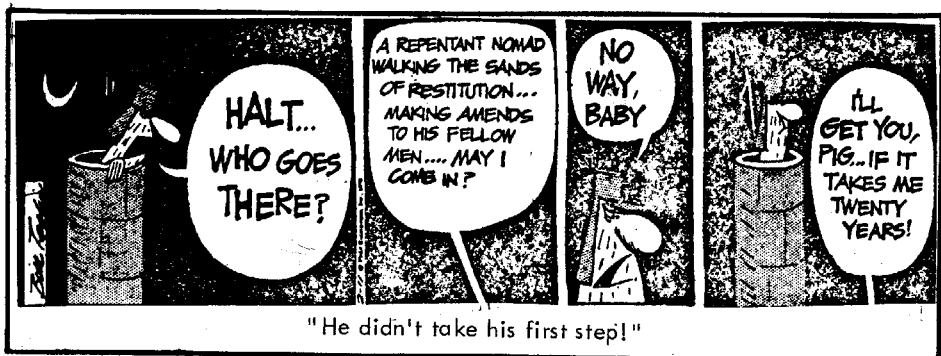
